Hughenden Neighbourhood. September 2011

Hello from the **Hughenden, Hazlemere & Chepping Wycombe Neighbourhood Police Team (HNPT)** and welcome to the August edition of the Newsletter for the **HUGHENDEN PARISH.**

The team would also love to hear from the community regarding any positive or negative feedback that you may have or any issues or concerns that you may wish to raise.

As you may or may not be aware, all of the team from Hazlemere have been involved with the national unrest. This has taken us away from our normal duties, but I trust you are all in good health and spirits without any incidents that have required Police attendance. These incidents shown by the media caused many people to use social networks to spread rumours. These can only be described as malicious and unfounded. Some of the persons responsible for starting these have been brought to justice.

SPEEDING:

The Speed Indication Device (SID) and residents using the Community Speed Watch (CSW) have been deployed in several areas.

On 28th July, the SID was deployed at Warrendene rd Hughenden Valley, travelling in both directions, during the time period of 1010-1200hrs, 175 vehicles passed the device. The average speed of the road user was recorded at 38MPH. However there were 9 vehicles in excess of the prosecution limit and therefore have received letters under the Community Speed Watch Scheme.

On 2nd August the SID was deployed on Main Road Walters Ash, travelling towards Hughenden Valley, between 1515-1600hrs The average speed of the road user was recorded at 28 MPH. However there were 11 vehicles in excess of the prosecution limit and therefore have received letters under the Community Speed Watch Scheme.

During the last 2 months the Roads Policing Department have been active in the Great Kingshill area, with the following results;

26/07 = 4x excess speed

05/08 = 10x excess speed, 3x not wearing seat belts

16/08 = 17 fixed penalty tickets for excess speed, mobile phone use, not wearing Seat belts, also an excessive tint to vehicle windows.

On 8th August, the SID was deployed on the Missenden Road, Great Kingshill, travelling towards Prestwood, between 1730- 1830hrs. The average speed of the road user was not recorded due to the volume of vehicles . However there were 106 vehicles in excess of the prosecution limit and therefore 85 of these have received letters under the Community Speed Watch Scheme

Please bear in mind that persons who receive Speed Watch letters are NOT given the speed which initiated the letter. There is a threshold which is strictly adhered to. When the device is activated the initial speed is the speed recorded by the operators and Not the speed as the vehicle passes the device. The speed captured is that of at least 70 metres prior to the device.

Dates have been set for the **September** period, the locations are yet to be established but each ward will have at least 1 SID deployment over the period. If you are interested in seeing how the device works or you are interested in becoming involved in the process, please contact Natalie Hall or Lee Turnham at the above address or e-mail. We will then be able to inform you of the location and time that is appropriate to your ward.

LITTER:

The parish still has a problem with persons throwing litter from vehicles as they pass through. If anyone can take a registration number of the offending vehicle and pass it to the HNPT, I will seek to issue the offender with a fixed penalty fine.

ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR:

There have been several reports regarding problems on Georges, Hill Widmer End, these have involved some youths from outside the area. The driver of a blue Ford Fiesta, has been issued a Section 59 warning letter for using his vehicle in an anti-social manner.

The youths have been gathering around the shops, using foul language and trying to damage property. Residents from the estate are calling Police regarding groups of youths travelling around the estate, they are shouting and using 'gutter' language and generally being a nuisance. Investigations are ongoing.

OTHER MATTERS;

POLICE OFFICE OPEN EVENING;

The Hazlemere Police Office open evening on the 22nd August was a great success. The area Superintendent was in attendance, along with members of the Neighbourhood Watch and Trading standards. The Police team were all able to assist with questions on a variety of issues.

PUBLISHED COURT RESULTS;

Robert JENNER, 49, of Hughenden Valley, drove a Motor vehicle otherwise in accordance with a licence and without insurance. Licence endorsed with six penalty points, fined £100 and costs of £80.

Geoffrey HARRINGTON, 21, of Great Kingshill, was found guilty of possession of a class B drug. Fined £115 and costs of £100.
